ACTIVITIES FUNDED BY THE PUBLIC

All funds raised from the public must be returned to public use, including money accumulated from invested public funds. These funds must not be used for administration, to benefit members, or for travel and meeting expenses for conventions.

ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

Administrative funds are supported through contributions from Lions through dues, fines, and other individual contributions. It is possible for Lions Clubs to fund their administration account in the following manner. Private fundraising activity limited to Lions Club members and their spouses.

Advertisement proceeds for club newsletters.

Donated member compensation for work as individual citizens at non Lion events, while not dressed or identified as Lions, this includes not wearing badges.

Deduct direct operating expenses of a fundraiser if the building is used to meet the needs of the community at large, the club may deduct an amount of the proceeds of

each activity held at the club house to go towards the operating expenses of the building.

I hope that this information is of use to clubs that man gates at football games etc for Administration Funds, and if wearing Lions identification then all income is to be used for ACTIVITIES.

Remember wear your BADGE with PRIDE.

Children of Courage program a well established project

THE Lions Children of Courage Award program is now established as an important and extremely worthwhile annual project of Lions Clubs International in WA.

The program was introduced in 1983 by the late DG Joe Mason, who saw a need to provide for an awards program through which Lions Clubs in WA could recognise a **very special group of young Western Australians** - and their families.

At that time, there were many awards that recognised the achievements of young people - except the children with *"special needs"*.

Since its modest beginnings, the Lions Children of Courage Awards has grown to be one of the most important annual events in the WA Lions' calendar.

What are the Lions Children of Courage Awards?

Definitely not a competition! Every recipient of an award is a *"winner"* in his or her own right, as the recognition of these young people's achievements will:

I Act as an encouragement for their future; Help them to believe in themselves and Help to increase their self-worth.

All children want to be accepted by others, regardless of any special needs they may have. These awards will portray them as children who have successfully overcome additional barriers which face them in this world.

Each year the children who are to receive an award, together with members of their nominating club and their families, are invited to attend a presentation. For the 2010/2011 Lions year, it will be held in the Dannatt Hall at St Mary's Anglican Girls' School, Elliot Road, Karrinyup on Sunday, March 6, 2011.

As each child is called forward for the presentation, a short summary of the reasons for the presentation and eligibility for the award is read. The recipient of the award then receives a framed certificate detailing the category under which the award is made and an engraved medallion.

Nominations are forwarded through local Lions Clubs for consideration and approval and are restricted to children between the ages of five and 15 years who have not previously received this award.

Categories of the Award Special Needs

Children with special needs who have shown courage in the face of adversity. Such children include those who are confined to wheelchairs, who are sight, hearing or speech impaired or have undergone long periods of medical treatment, surgery or hospitalisation, which has perhaps brought pain and trauma to their young lives.

Nominees in this category will be those children who have attempted to overcome these obstacles and who have striven to improve the quality of their lives.

Courageous Act or Deed

A child who without regard for personal safety, has been instrumental in the preservation of life and/or property, or has rendered assistance at an accident, or whose concern for others is worthy of recognition.

Outstanding Sporting Achievements

A child who has overcome personal hardship and/or disadvantage to achieve a high degree of sporting prowess as an individual, or as a good team member.

Is your Club doing the right thing?

Some Clubs may, unknowingly, be acting outside their own Constitutional requirements when it comes to the financial accounts and audits.

A recent set of circumstances has prompted me to write this article to clarify the actual situation.

Sometimes well meaning Lions members, even Past District Governors, have attempted to verbally pass on their understanding of the situation and this may have caused a few misunderstandings.

I have had comments ranging from "Oh we only have a small turnover so we were told we didn't have to send audited figures to the Cabinet Treasurer" to "We were not aware this was required". I do understand when new people take on an executive position in their club and they haven't attended an Incoming Officers Forum or had an organised handover from their predecessor, knowledge is lost or misunderstood. It is with that in mind I submit the following information.

The *Associations Incorporation Act 1987* does not require accounts to be audited, but the association itself (e.g. The Lions Club of Country River Inc.) requires an audit to be carried out.

This requirement is specifically identified in the *Lions Club Constitution and By-Laws State of Western Australia* document that all or at least most of our District 201W2 Clubs operate under.

ARTICLE IX – Board of Directors – Section E (4) states:-

It shall have the **books, accounts and operations of this club audited annually** or, in its discretion, more frequently and may require an accounting or have an audit made of the handling of any club funds by any officer, committee or member of this club.

ARTICLE XII – Meetings -- Section E states:-

The annual general meeting of this club shall be held within four months after the end of the club's financial year at a time and place determined by the board of directors. Not less than fourteen days notice of the time

and place of this meeting shall be given to each member. **The business at this meeting shall be to receive the audited accounts of the club showing the financial position at the end of the immediately preceding financial year**, the final reports of the retiring directors; and any other business proper to an annual general meeting.

Subsequent to these two references the District 201W2 Constitution and By-Laws refers to the audit requirements in BYLAW 1:-

All clubs in the district shall forward to the cabinet secretary **an audited statement of the financial affairs of the club to cover all accounts to be received by the cabinet secretary prior to 30th September and to cover the financial period previous to 30th June.**

Any club that has not submitted to the Cabinet Treasurer its audited financial statements which were due in the previous financial year (which would be one year overdue) will not be granted delegate voting status at the District Convention.

As previously mentioned, the current Act does not require accounts to be audited but in November 2006, the Government of Western Australia released a draft revision of its associations legislation for public comment. A large number of submissions were received and these will ultimately help shape the detail of the new legislation.

Consideration is being given to requiring certain associations to have their annual financial statements audited or examined by a bookkeeper.

The extent of the audit requirement would probably depend upon the extent of the association's financial transactions and assets. There would also be some flexibility given in regard to the qualifications required of an auditor.

This only means that as responsible incorporated bodies charged with managing public monies, we should already, in my opinion, have a qualified person audit the Club accounts.

A fair number of our Clubs are responsi-

ble for thousands of dollars of public monies and we need to continue to show we are open and accountable to anyone who wishes to enquire about our activities.

Finally there is an additional benefit in this audit process - funding body agreements might require the association's accounts to be audited to ensure that the funds provided are used according to the funding agreement and for the purpose stated in the agreement and your club is well placed to take advantage.

One of the best ways I know of establishing correct information is to ask for the reference in written form.

If someone gives you verbal opinion, back it up with a friendly question like "and can you direct me to where I would find this written down?" Opinions from well meaning Lions may not necessarily be facts; they could just be an interpretation or personal thought.

If you need further information or clarification of this information please do not hesitate to contact me and I will be happy to help.

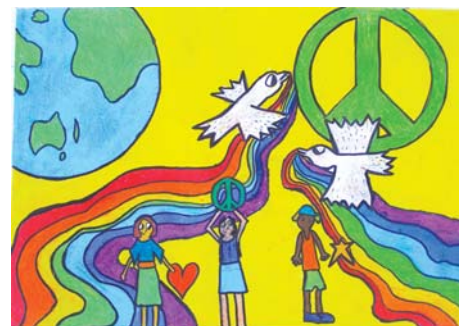
Margaret would like you to please consider getting involved in this great **Youth Program** which takes very little of your time. Here's what to do to get you started . . .

Christchurch earthquake details

To all Lions in MD 201 W2 greetings from a shaken Christchurch. I have been asked to write to you as the clubs in Australia are wanting to help in some way. I have been in touch with Civil Defence and the Welfare posts and advised them that we are waiting to help. The advice I got on September 8 was to sit back and wait. The Red Cross and the Salvation Army are feeding the volunteers and the displaced residents. It will be in the coming weeks that we will be needed once the first wave of volun-

teers takes a much needed break.

The best way that the clubs of Australia can help at this stage is with monetary donations. To bring over goods and then to store them has been discouraged by the authorities here.

The "Christchurch Earthquake Relief Fund" is now open to accept donations and the account number is 03-1903-0136157-03.

This is a CBS Canterbury Bank account with a Westpac prefix.

Here is a great idea to improve your Christmas cake sales. Why not place an advertisement in your local newspaper with a cake hotline. WA hotline number is 1300 300 205, or the Lions Australia website or your own website.

All sales generated through these mediums are referred to on a post code allocation basis or as directed by the purchaser.

Another way to promote sales establish a report with the local IGA store or a real-estate agent who might give away a Christmas cake as part of the sale of a house even the local car dealer. Other outlets which can be considered include local banks, post offices, government offices, school P&C, police stations, building societies, credit unions, even Bunnings or other hardware stores. The list goes on and on. If you have a retirement village close by see if you can arrange a display in the foyer.

CORPORATE BUSINESS

Is there any large corporate business houses in your catchment area? If so contact the general manager as soon as possible with the view of supplying Lions Christmas cakes for staff/customer as Christmas bonuses etc. After the initial contact, follow up a couple of weeks later with a phone call.
